	100% Deductible meals – i.e. Food & beverage for a company wide holiday party
	50% Deductible meals – i.e. Employee travel meals

	Standard Mileage – Keep log of miles driven for business purposes vs personal use
	Actual cost – Keep track of all costs related to operating vehicle
	(i.e. fuel, oil, repairs, maintenance, registration, insurance, etc.)
	(i.e. ruei, oii, repairs, maintenance, registration, insurance, etc.)
	Charitable Donations
	Commissions paid
	Contract Labor
	Payments to individuals you hire to help complete a project or task, not included on payroll
	Note: If you pay them more than \$600 during the year, you'll need to issue them a Form 1099

	Materials & labor used to create your product
	Wholesale costs of products purchased to resell

Generally, items used in business that are expected to last more than 1yr and cost more than \$2,500
 Health Insurance Premiums
Owner health insurance
Employee benefit medical insurance premiums
 Healthcare Spending Account Contributions
Employer matching HSA contributions
Home Office Expenses
Simplified method - \$5 per square foot of business space, up to 300 square feet
Standard method – Business use portion of actual housing expenses paid during the year
(i.e. rent/mortgage, utilities, property taxes, repairs, etc.)

Improvements to office space
Energy efficient improvements to business property
 Interest
Interest paid on business loan or business credit card
 Legal & professional fees
Fees paid to lawyer to help establish and register business
Accountant fees for fling business tax returns
Monthly fees paid to business bookkeeper/accountant
 Office Supplies
Paper, pens, postage, etc.
 Professional Dues
Rent
 Payments made for leased office space
Equipment or machine rental
 Repairs & Maintenance
Retirement Plan Contributions
 SEP IRA, 401(k), etc.
 Salaries, Wages & Benefits
Payroll for employees, payroll taxes paid
Employee benefits including paid time off, medical and dental benefits
Employer paid retirement plan matching contributions

This list is not an exhaustive list of all available deductions, but it gives a great start to what you should be tracking in your business. Deducting business expenses is only possible if the expenses are ordinary and necessary for your business's operation. This includes the costs involved with starting, owning, and operating your business. Your expenses must be relatively normal in your industry and clearly supportive of your for-profit business's fundamental operation. You also need adequate supporting documents and accounting records to provide evidence for the expense itself and its purpose.
